Taihape Heritage Plaque Project

The Taihape Heritage Plaque Project held the first meeting of our volunteer researchers in the last days of May. A wide range of people have come forward. The meeting covered a discussion of the project as a whole. Peter Kipling-Arthur, the lead researcher outlined the research project and the need for accuracy and ethics. The each of the researchers talked briefly about their particular person of interest, and then the group made an initial assessment of the names that had been put forward to date. This year the aim is to look to make the community aware of people from Taihape's earlier years plus to provide a range that is gender and ethnically diverse.

Our next meeting will be at 5.00pm Thursday 24th June at the Town Hall Council Chambers. A review of current progress plus any new researchers will be welcomed. As always an appraisal of any further names suggested by the wider community will occur.

Tell me More Taihape Project

This project is another heritage project undertaken by the Taihape Community Development Trust. It will produce three anthologies that capture the history of our region through the memories of generations as told to our youth.

Wrapped around the recollections of Taihape past, this is a legacy the Taihape of today will leave for the Taihape of tomorrow. Taihape Community Development Trust is working closely with staff and students at Taihape Area School.

Being involved means more than just history. The students will learn transferrable skills of researching, interviewing, documentation, and verification of information. This project gives the opportunity to create a story based on true events, giving our region a refreshed and dynamic view of its past.

The project will produce three 40-60-page A5 booklets over three years. This year the theme is 'What are we? Buildings and infrastructure'.

A 1-day workshop will be provided on the 1st of July 2021 by Rachel Selby, who grew up in Taihape and was head girl in the mid-60s at Taihape College. Rachael is an indigenous Maori researcher, writer, and teacher from Otaki NZ. Rachael has lectured at Massey University and a **kaiāwhina** at Te Wananga o Raukawa in Otaki.

The Trust is proud to be promoting the preservation of Taihape's Heritage.

Gardening in Taihape

Leading on from last month and thinking about focal points in our gardens and creating a journey, we will now talk about the ever changing garden. It will be important throughout the cooler months to lay the groundwork for major changes in the garden which will set us up for spring.

When thinking about your garden it's wise to remember that no garden stays still, a garden is an evolving and ever changing artwork. If you use a planting palette with minimal change then you shall see minimal change for example a garden structured with just hedges, other than the maintenance they will offer little more than a varied shade of green.

Think about the layering of plants and texture. Bigger trees will provide the backbone of your design and offer grey silhouettes in the dappled sunlight. Natural materials like stone and rocks will provide a silvery grey shimmer in the morning dew and the new foliage from bulbs emerging through the bare earth ushering in a new season. This all leads us through the yearly cycle and the changes in our atmosphere, we are privileged in Taihape to have such great growing conditions and have the fullness of four seasons.

Layers upon layers of textures can also tell a story and lead you through the garden on a journey throughout the season change. At the moment it may seem a dreary outlook but carefully planning out your garden will offer year round stimulation for the sensors.





INTERIOR STYLING

Colour with in design is a science, it has a full vocabulary and also it's own phycology including principal methods of colour palettes.

All this proven to interrupt what we call *Colours*.

The science – colour isn't a physical thing it is wave lengths of light that bounces off an object.

All the colours our human eyes can see are what we call a *Spectrum* (ultra violet and infrared are undetected by our eyes.) To help understand the spectrum we will refer to the two opposites

in colour.

death, mystery, evil but also knowledge (as in graduation robes).

White - purity, innocence and cleanliness.

Yellow – is the happiest of all colours, we reflect on the sunshine, warmth, summer. Keep in mind

a little can go a long way.

Red - danger, passion, energy, excitement and love. Red draws peoples attention.

Green -the colour of nature a positive colour that gives a sense of balance, growth and if Irish considered good luck.

Blue – can actually slow your heart rate ... Seen as trust, tranquillity and hope. Not the best colour

for kitchens or dining room, it one of the most appetizing colours.

Orange -an attention grabbing colour, bold and fun... reminds us all of Autumn.

Grey – Timeless and rock solid, positivity, being neutral the warmth or coolness comes from the proportion and hues of the colour.

Brown- another neutral – colour of, stability and nature.

On reflection I think we all see an enormous array of colour's every day, our brains are bombarded with different colour's hues, and tones our brain can easily jump by muscle memory association which in turn creates an emotion..... Think of it- your child and the big M from Mc Donald's ... Yellow and Red-

Excitement to eat creating energy and love, the Yellow reflecting happiness, warmth from the food making your child appetite satisfied.

Colour and light also have science – a lack of light makes an area timeless – examples are Casino's, they normally have no windows, no clocks, no natural light. Designed on a principal their clients become unaware to the time of day or night therefore people are happy to spend longer than they would gambling.

When looking at colours – think of the room and it's application, reflect on the emotion – is it sad?

Is it happy? - Is it warm? - Is it cold?..... and so on....

Your next project with paint should feed you as a person, forget fashion to a degree and live in a coloured space you are happy to be in.
