The best place to view cars over the weekend would be at the Concours d'elegance on main highway at the north of town, 10.30 to 11.30am Saturday 27th This will be followed by a gymkhana in the afternoon.

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Council News

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FROM THE Mayor's Desk

It's nice to be back on deck having recovered from recent knee surgery mid-January. I'm very appreciative of the medical staff and have tried to obey their guidelines and the result is I am far more mobile and in less pain than a month ago. The Long Term Plan (LTP) adoption for consultation will be made by Council on 25 March. We are also presently loading onto the Council website locations and timings of a number of public consultation meetings where you can have your say and ask for further information. Please engage in this process, I would have to say that this has been the most difficult process that I have been involved with during my time on Council. There is so much uncertainty that we face from Central Government around who will deliver what services throughout the country such as the provision of water and disposal of wastewater. This is the biggest decision that Councils in New Zealand will ever face. If these services are no longer to be provided by Councils in the future, it comes into question what will be the core function of Councils?

The recent revaluation for the district has seen a number of properties especially in the urban south dramatically increase in value. This variation in the increases of capital values throughout the district creates rating issues. Council has limited availability to smooth these effects. This is one of the reasons why the submission process this year is incredibly important. We will go out to everybody that we possibly can within the district and explain the implications of the LTP and give indications as to the likelihood of their personal rates positions. There has been public notice on the closure of the Kuripapango Bridge in Taihape. This is

the bridge that is on the boundary between Hastings District Council and Rangitikei District Council. Its closure effectively means that heavy transport is not available during that time. Because of




the seasonal nature of these farming stations I apologise for the timing of the bridge closure and the impact it has both financially and logistically on the operation of these stations. I appreciate those who took part in the Zoom call to look for ways in which we could work with the stations to provide minimum interruption during the repair period.

I have received a number of invitations recently from the northern region and one being the invitation to attend the Mokai Patea Big Day Out. It was a pleasure to be there. I am deeply appreciative of the invitations. I attended the Farewell Functions at the Taihape Fire Station a couple of weeks ago. It was nice to be able to sit with past and present fire personnel that have given so much voluntary time for their district. I've been aware that there have been many callouts for our rural firefighters over the last couple of weeks. We have had a large spring flush of grass growth which is mainly now tinder dry. We are asking that everybody considers fire risk when they have their barbecues and undertake normal farming operations.

I also note that a water restriction notice had gone out to conserve water in Taihape. Staff tell me, that notice had the desired effect and that water consumption has reversed. This is something we have to battle with for the balance of summer and I thank people for their water conservation.

Sleep, Do you get a Restful sleep?

A Stressful Life

Chronic stress is unavoidable in our modern, 24-hour-aday society, with its constant stream of social media and abundance of news. Every day, we can see that this stress can have a negative effect on peoples' sleep patterns. The association between stress and sleep is related to circadian misalignment, and the interactive effects of stress and eircadian rhythm on cortisol secretion (adrenal function)

The Daily Dance Between Cortisol & Melatonin

Under normal conditions, cortisol secretion follows a particular circadian rhythm. The circadian clock in the hypothalamus, (mid brain) triggers the release of cortisol from the adrenal glands to facilitate waking and alertness during the day. Specifically, cortisol increases rapidly during the second part of the night, peaks shortly after awakening and declines progressively throughout the day to reach their lowest in the evening.

Melatonin secretion is triggered on exposure to darkness and follows an opposing pattern, rising in the evening, peaking in the middle of the night, and tapering off in the early hours of the morning. These two hormones together play a vital role in co-ordinating the circadian rhythm and regulating sleep/wake cycle.

However, they are both responsive to other external cues, including light exposure and stress, which can alter their secretion and skew the circadian rhythm.

Circadian Misalignment is Common

Physical and psychological stress activates the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis (HPA), triggering increased and/or continuous release of cortisol from the adrenal gland, even after 6:00pm when cortisol levels should be decreasing. As cortisol and melatonin are antagonistic, this increased cortisol can inhibit the normal release of melatonin from the pineal gland. This results in profound disturbance of the circadian rhythm, where cortisol levels may remain elevated until late at night and melatonin levels subsequently do not begin to rise until after midnight. Known as circadian misalignment, this disruption to the normal cortisol/melatonin diurnal pattern has been clearly linked to insomnia Restoring the normal diurnal rhythm of cortisol and melatonin release is an important part of addressing stress-related insomnia.

How to regulate this Daily Dance?

Gamma-aminobutyric acid (GABA) is the primary inhibitory neurotransmitter in the brain, and it plays a vital role in sleep onset and sleep maintenance Some useful GABAergic herbs for insomnia and anxiety include:

 Ziziphus has been used as an anxiolytic for centuries. Human clinical trials have found that supplementation with ziziphus in combination with other herbs significantly improves all measures of sleep quality

• California poppy is a sedative and anxiolytic herb with GABAergic activity. Human trials have confirmed that California poppy, in combination with other herbs, improves sleep onset

 Passionflower has a long history of traditional use for insomnia and anxiety. Passionflower extracts have been found to contain naturally occurring GABA.

• Lavender has been used orally, topically and via inhalation for its calming effects. Multiple human clinical trials have confirmed that both orally ingested and inhaled lavender oil has significant beneficial effects in anxiety, and in improving sleep quality

and duration trough GABAergic mechanisms

The role Of Nutritional supplements

Magnesium, orally taken before bed helps to have a more restful sleep, and can be combined with each of the above botanicals to enhance the sleep rest cycle

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Gardening in Taihape

This time of year, our garden beds are starting to show the stress of the warmer day's past, however some are still teaming with colour and life with a blaze of autumn colour coming through during this month. The ever-present threat of pest will still be there and as discussed in previous months a topical spray should reduce this and keep the flower beds looking in peak condition for the last flush before winter dormancy.

In cooler climates such as ours, our vegetable gardens will be starting to come into their own and the harvesting of crops like tomatoes, beans and cucumbers should be nearing completion. March will be an important month to start the sowing of winter crops and even a late planting of broccoli, silverbeet and spinach.

To bind your property together a nice lawn is often the go. Final preparations for an autumn sowing should be made, be sure to also sow seed that is right for your property.

Many shrubs can be easily propagated from cuttings. This can be achieved by semi mature tip cuttings by selecting good young strong shoots from the upper portion of the shrub. Plant out in small containers rather than directly into the earth, I find recycling old plant pots handy. I generally use a sand/soil mix to establish a good root system but like all gardening it's always trial and error. Keep the new cuttings well-watered, warm and in no time at all you'll be plating your new shrubs out into your flower beds or creating a hedge.

Norwood Rural Sports Awards

The New Zealand Boot-throwing Association Inc. has been successful again in having a nomination to the Norwood Rural Sports Awards make it through to the finals. Curly Troon is a finalist for the Toyota Legacy Award. The winner will be announced at the Rural Awards dinner in Palmerston North on Friday 12 March.

This is the fourth time an NZBTA nominee has made it to the finals. Kristin Churchward was a finalist in the Rural Sportswoman of the Year in 2017, Elizabeth Mortland for the Toyota Legacy Award in 2018, Kieran Fowler in the Rural Sportsman of the Year in 2019, and Curly Troon in 2021 – all involved in gumboot throwing!

Curly has been involved with gumboot throwing since Gumboot Day in 1985. He has been a thrower, a winner, an organiser, a promoter, a demonstrator, a helper. He was a founding member of NZBTA and has been on the Board since 2014, as Chairperson since 2018. Curly is key in organising NZBTA championship events and Have a Go competitions in both the North and South Islands. He is the man! He is on the field all day – out marking where boots land, returning the boots, measuring throws, setting up the field, packing up. He makes himself available to demonstrate gumboot throwing when TV or radio crews pass through Taihape and request a gumboot throwing session.

Taihape Community Development Trust set up the NZBTA in 2014 – to promote Taihape and gumboot throwing throughout New Zealand. Throwers come from all over the North Island to attend the gumboot throwing competitions on Gumboot Day. The New Zealand Championships will be held at the Rural Games in Palmerston North on Saturday 13 March.
